Handwriting

During the school day there is a huge emphasis on handwriting and presentation. Children practise these skills daily at school and are proud of their writing. Please pay attention to your child's presentation when completing homework.

Time spent on homework

At Our Lady of Lourdes we recognise that each child is unique and therefore the 'homework experience' will be different for each of them. Some children will work quicker than others and get more done in less time, others will take longer or may choose to extend their homework with additional activities. All children will be provided with opportunities for learning, through homework, from starting school in Reception.

What happens when homework is completed?

Your child's class teacher will assess the work and give feedback either through written comments, verbally or where projects are concerned, through sharing with the class/others in

Homework may also be assessed using tests e.g. spelling and times table tests.



Types of Homework



In Reception Class and KS1, reading is the most important homework.

We ask every parent/carer to support their child and the school in practising times tables. From Year 2 children have a TT Rockstars account which can support this. The importance of children having fluency in their times table recall can not be emphasised enough. Children can not meet their end of year expectations fully, unless they are able to recall and apply this knowledge accurately and speedily.
