




This is Pablo. He used to be an ordinary banana, just like all the other bananas that grow in this banana farm, in a hot country far away.

#### ACTIVITY


Draw the children's attention to what Paloma and her family are eating. You can explain that banana farmers can't always afford a lot of food and can only afford basic food like rice and beans. Rice and beans are good to eat, but it means that they have this all the time and do not have food like meat, fish and other vegetables to make sure they have a good and healthy diet. What do the children think about just having rice and beans every day?

...and sailed for many days and nights on a big ship.






